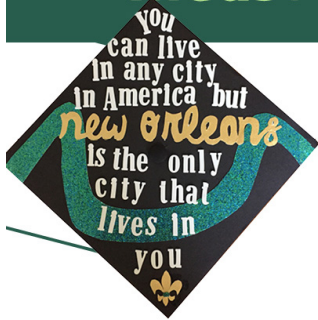

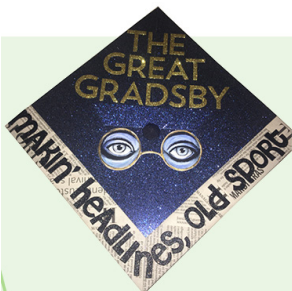

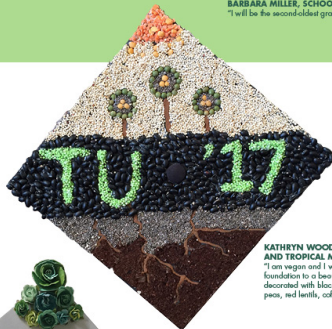
ZOE ALBERT, SCHOOL OF SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING
