Tulane experts continue to share their knowledge in the wake of hurricanes Harvey, Irma and now Maria. And the biggest gift ever to Tulane's School of Medicine made big news. Here are the national headlines.

Historian Andy Horowitz had an <u>Op-Ed in the New York Times</u>. He says lawmakers should avoid the mistakes made in New Orleans as the city recovered from Hurricane Katrina. Horowitz was also quoted in the Washington Post.

Demographer and sociologist Mark Vanlandingham of the School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine spoke with NPR <u>about what lessons Harvey victims can learn</u> from the Vietnamese community in New Orleans.
