Last year when Colombo and his family were considering applying for the position, they went to the <u>residence hall</u> one evening. "We came and sat outside on the steps and met with some of the students," says Colombo, an associate professor of psychology. "They took us in and showed us around and introduced us to other students. We had such a positive experience then, that we knew we wanted to at least apply for the position."

Other faculty members also vied for the position through a rigorous application and interview process. <u>Colombo</u> was notified last spring that he and his family had been selected to move in.

The Colombo family is the second to live in the residence hall since it opened in 2005. Christopher Dunn, associate professor of Spanish and Portuguese, and his family were the first "family-in-residence" at Wall.

Professors-in-residence are asked to commit to a three-year stay. The two-bedroom, two-and-a-half-bathroom faculty apartment features a private entrance, full kitchen, dining area, living room and large study. The professor-in-residence also has a reserved parking space.

Lyle Colombo, who taught philosophy at Loyola University for eight years before becoming a stay-at-home mom, says that she is thrilled at the opportunity to get back to a university setting and have the opportunity to interact daily with students.

"This is such a wonderful and stimulating environment for myself and Audrey Paige," she says. "It has turned out to be a really amazing experience."
