"style side dishes for the dinner, including cornbread, sweet potatoes, macaroni and cheese, dirty rice, green bean casserole, pies and more.

Sodexo, which provides dining services at Tulane, is donating the turkeys and dressing. Attendees are asked to bring a vegetable or dessert, if possible.

Also as part of the holiday festivities, the Tulane Black Faculty and Staff Association is collecting canned goods to create food baskets for needy families.

"The Thanksgiving dinner helps international students and scholars build social relationships," Gowdey says. "Lots of the international students come here without knowing anyone, and programming such as this gives them opportunities to interact with each other. It's heartwarming to see cross-cultural friendships develop."

More than 500 international students attended last year's dinner, he says.
