
The New Orleans Book Festival at Tulane University announces complete lineup, ticket information

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The New Orleans Book Festival at Tulane University announced today the muchanticipated complete lineup for its inaugural event, March 19-21, on Tulane University's uptown campus. It will feature more than 100 renowned and rising authors, including 11 talented and award-winning children's authors for Family Day at the Festival on Saturday, March 21.

This one-of-a-kind book festival will have a distinct New Orleans flavor with live jazz music, cooking presentations from several top chefs and some of the Crescent City's most colorful authors and political figures. Lively author discussions, moderated conversations, panel discussions, book sales and at least one major plenary session featuring a leading author will highlight each day. The book festival is free and open to the public. However, there will be three keynote author sessions where tickets are required, including a pair of opening-night events on Thursday, March 19, with "Michael Lewis in Conversation with Sean Tuohy," from 5-6 p.m., and "A Conversation with John Grisham," from 6-7 p.m. The author's session on Friday, March 20, will feature "Malcolm Gladwell in Conversation with Michael Lynton, Chairman of Snap Inc.," from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m.

General admission tickets for Thursday and Friday's keynote events are \$10 each. Students will be admitted free with a valid identification card. However, space is limited. Click here to purchase tickets.

All events will take place on Tulane's uptown campus, including the Lavin-Bernick Center for University Life, McAlister Auditorium, Goldring/Woldenberg Business Complex, Dixon Hall, The Commons and the Berger Family Lawn.
