

Students ring in the Lunar New Year

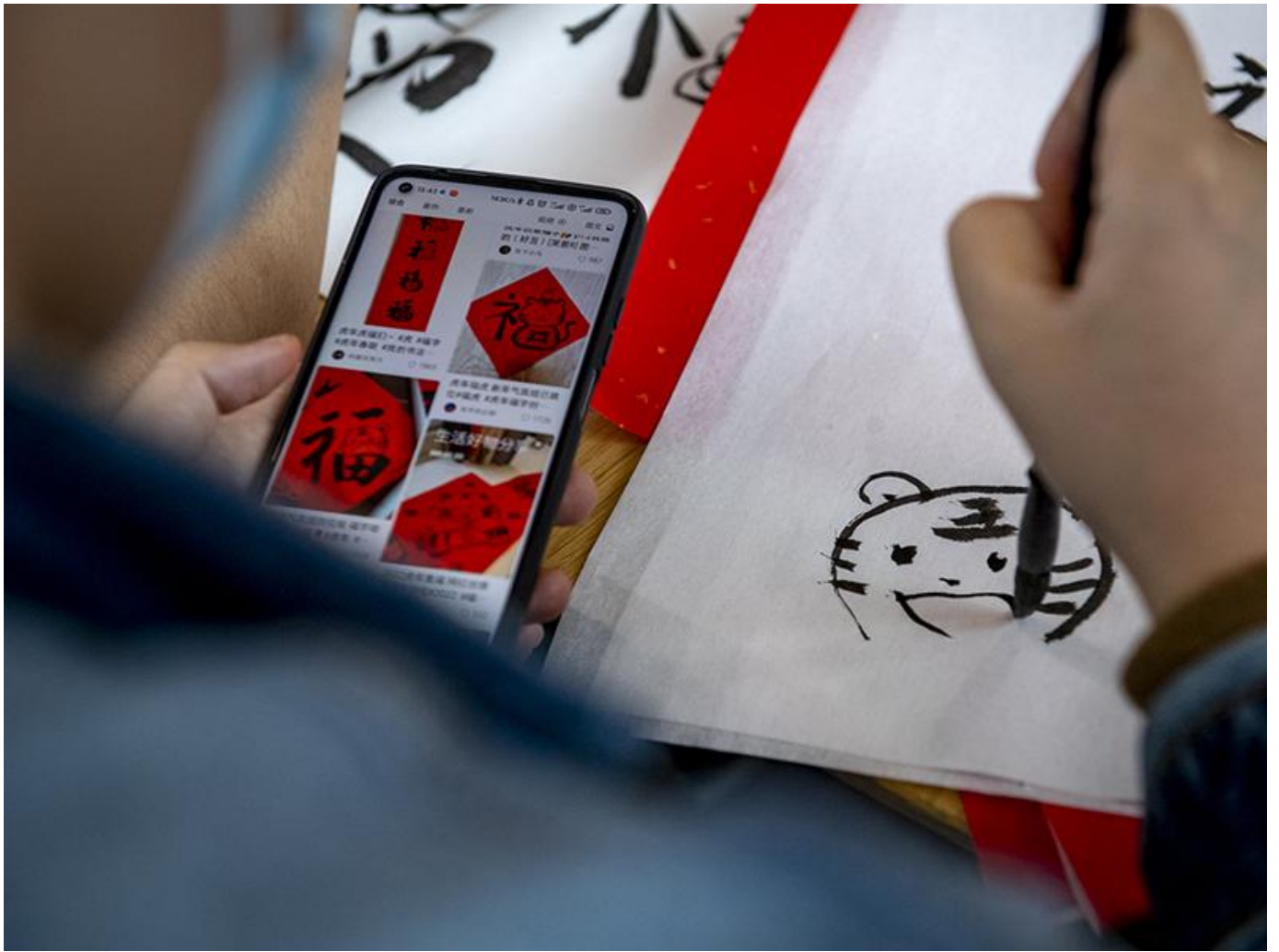
