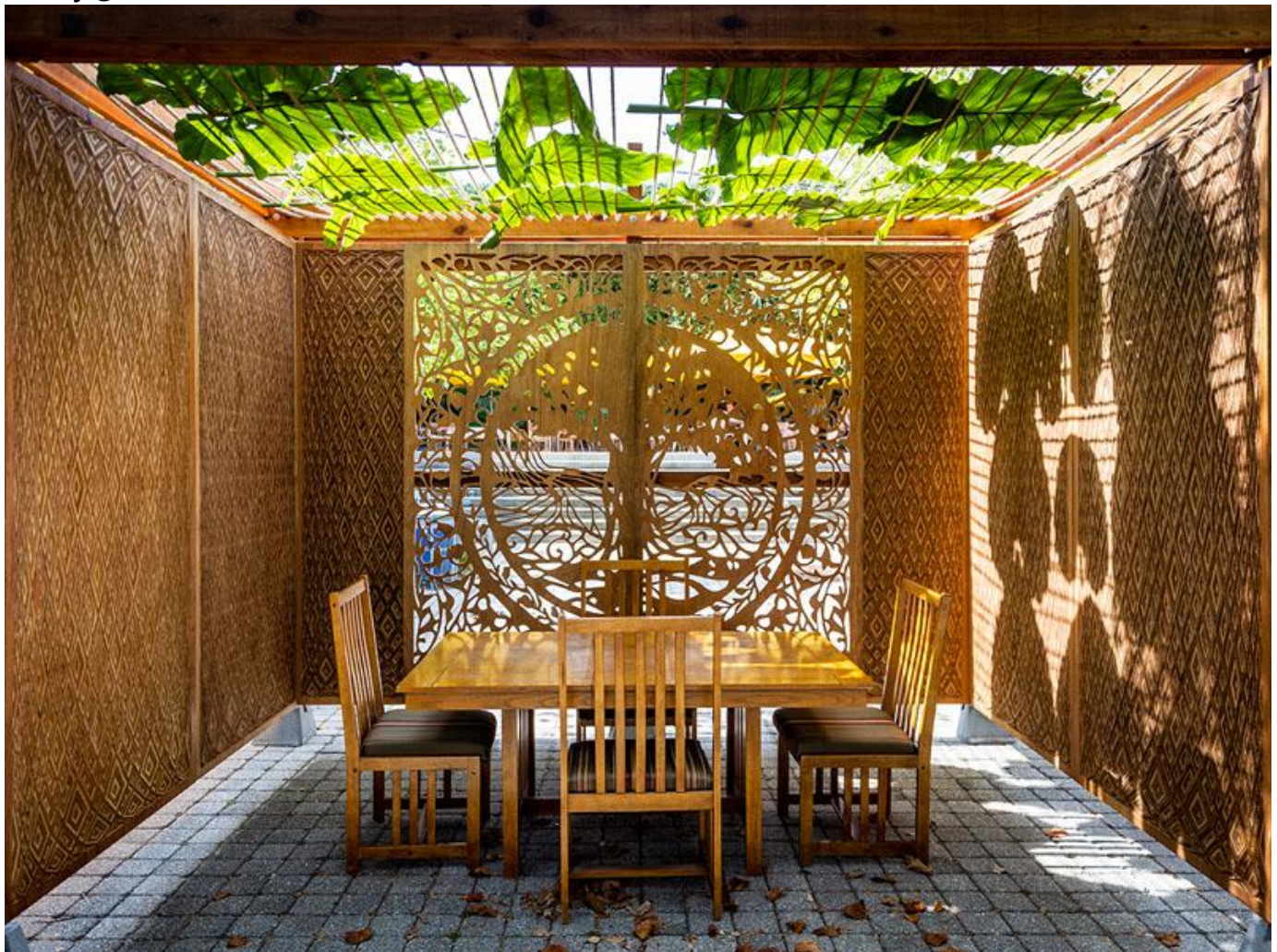


Sukkah built in Pocket Park is an annual tradition

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A team of volunteers, led by Tulane School of Architecture students Seth Laskin and Ethan Lewis, designed and constructed this year's Sukkan, an outdoor pavilion for dining and living, in Pocket Park outside of the Lavin-Bernick Center for University Life. Now in its 14th year, the partnership between the school and Tulane Hillel provides funding for the Sukkan to be built for the eight-day Jewish harvest festival of Sukkot, which began Oct. 9 this year.
