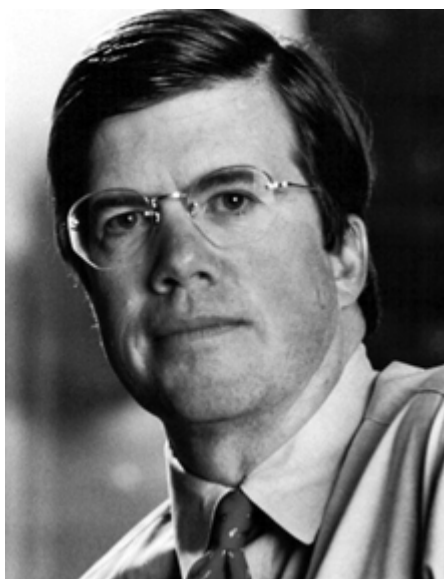


Michael McKeever Joins Board of Tulane

Michael McKeever, who enjoyed a successful career at Lehman Brothers before retiring in 2000 to become the managing partner of Legacy Venture Partners, LLC, has joined the Board of Tulane, the main governing body of Tulane University.

McKeever, who earned a bachelor's degree in economics and an MBA from Tulane, started as an associate in the Investment Banking Division of Lehman Brothers in 1979 and later became co-head of the Investment Banking Division, co-head of the Equity Division and head of the Private Equity Division. He also chaired the firm's investment committee. Prior to joining Lehman Brothers, McKeever worked at the First National Bank of Chicago.

A former swimmer at Tulane, McKeever is a past member of the T-Club, an organization of former Tulane student athletes who support the Green Wave's

athletic programs. He also is a member of the Tulane President's Council.
