In honor of total giving to Tulane University of at least \$1 million, 31 individuals and organizations were inducted into the Paul Tulane Society at a ceremony on March 15 in the Freeman Auditorium at the Woldenberg Art Center.

The honorees, each of whom received a medal with a decorative ribbon in the Tulane blue and green colors, have supported projects across the university and its campuses, including significant gifts to expand the university's community involvement efforts.
