
The Insider: Have a vintage Christmas



This old house, 1958? This card was sent from the home of Reinhard Steinmayer, head of the Tulane University Geology Department for many years. Political dreams, 1972? This card features a young John Breaux, who was elected to Congress in 1972, the same year the card is dated. It is one of many political holiday cards donated to the Louisiana Research Collection by Carolyn Kolb.

"It's a nice example of how much information something as simple as a Christmas card can contain," says Lee Miller, head of the Louisiana Research Collection. "We
