Tulane University alumni, faculty, staff and more than 1,000 students will volunteer throughout the city on Saturday, Aug. 29 as part of Outreach Tulane, a day-long volunteer effort in various neighborhoods of New Orleans. This year, Tulane"s annual community service event coincides with the fourth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, which made landfall in New Orleans on August 29, 2005, leading to levee failure and massive devastation of the city.
