MORE: <u>The Tulane-LSU project</u> grew out of efforts by the Louisiana Landmarks Society to ensure that the structure is not destroyed or damaged when it comes under new ownership. Located at 701 S. Carrollton Ave., the old courthouse was built in 1855 and is on the National Trust for Historic Preservation's list of 11 Most Endangered Historic Places. The presentation is open to the public.
