Bruce Raeburn, director of Tulane University Special Collections and curator of the <u>Hogan Jazz Archive</u>, is a 2016 "Spirit of Satch" Jazz Education Award honoree. The award is presented during the opening ceremony of the Satchmo SummerFest in Jackson Square.

"It's an honor," <u>Raeburn</u> said. "I feel like I've developed very strong relationships with the people who put on Satchmo SummerFest, so to be recognized by them really is touching. It was a complete surprise." The <u>Satchmo SummerFest</u>, an event staged by French Quarter Festivals Inc., includes musical performances, lectures, panel discussions and lots of food. This is the second year that the festival has bestowed "Spirit of Satch" honors.

To Raeburn, the study of Satchmo is New Orleans' gift to music scholarship.
